# 1 INTRODUCTION

This document is intended as a reference guide to the usage of AT command set for the 9602-LP Iridium satellite tracker. Note that AT commands may be periodically modified, removed or added; therefore users should always check for the latest revision by logging on to NAL Research's anonymous ftp site (under RESOURCE CENTER of website [www.nalresearch.com](http://www.nalresearch.com)).

For proper communications between the 9602-LP and the connected DTE (Data Terminal Equipment), the DTE must have the following settings:

1. Baud rate of 19.2 Kbits/sec
2. Flow control off
3. Three-wire serial interface with the 9602-LP (Tx, Rx and GND)

The 9602-LP has two modes of operation—Command mode and Tracking mode. When in Command mode, the 9602-LP operates as a standard modem with GPS. AT commands can be entered to configure the 9602-LP's operating profiles, send or receive SBD messages, or get GPS positions. When in Tracking mode, the 9602-LP automatically transmits GPS reports defined by parameters in the active operating profile. The 9602-LP is factory-set to power up in Command mode, which can be re-programmed with the AT^START command to power up in Tracking mode.

## 2 COMMAND OVERVIEW

An AT command is a string of characters sent by the DTE to the 9602-LP while the 9602-LP is in Command mode. During Tracking mode, the only AT command accepted by the 9602-LP is a sequence of three pluses (+++). All other commands are ignored. An AT command string has a prefix, a body, and a terminator. The prefix consists of the ASCII upper case characters AT or lower case characters at. The body is a string of commands restricted to printable ASCII characters. The terminator is the carriage return <CR> character.

### 2.1 COMMAND ENTRY

AT command syntax is critical and the following rules apply:

- All commands (apart from A/ and +++) begin with the prefix of AT or at.
- The commands in a command string (apart from A/ and +++) are executed only after the return or enter key is pressed.
- Use of upper or lower case letters are allowed, but not a combination of both.
- The maximum number of characters in a command string is 128.
- If the numeric parameter n is omitted from the basic command entry, a value of zero is assumed for n.
- If an optional parameter is omitted from an extended command, the current value is implied. Optional parameters are enclosed by square brackets ([...]) in this document.
- Multiple commands can be concatenated into a single command line by separating the additional non-prefixed commands with a space or a semicolon or with no separator.
- Spaces entered into a command string for clarity between the AT prefix and the body of the command are ignored. Likewise, spaces entered for clarity within the command body between alpha characters and decimal parameters are ignored.
- Backspace can be used to edit AT commands.

- The single quotes (') are used to enclose sensitive information such as passwords. When an entry is enclosed by the single quotes and the 9602-LP is set to echo, the entry is replaced with asterisks (\*) instead of the actual value.
- For the commands requiring the Crypto Officer Password or the ^ID command, all character values may be entered. For passwords containing the single quote ('), a backslash must be entered in front of it. Similarly, for passwords containing a backslash (\), an additional backslash must be entered in front of it as well. For example, the password Qt3&\v'3 would be entered as 'Qt3&\\v'3'. If underscore (\_) is used in the ID field, it will appear as spaces in NAL Research's provided PC software because of backwards compatibility issues with the A3LA-DGS and the A3LA-TSS.
- For the ^ID command with the static identifiers containing the double quote ("), they must be entered with a backslash (\) in front of it. For static identifiers containing a backslash (\), an additional backslash must be entered in front of it as well. For example, for static identifier The "fast" ship\boat would be entered as "The \"fast\" ship\\boat". All entries with \\, \' and \" are treated as single character in length.
- Characters that proceed the AT prefix are ignored.
- CTRL-X will abort a command line input.

## 2.2 COMMAND RESPONSES

A result code is sent to the DTE by the 9602-LP in response to the execution of an AT command. It may also occur unsolicited from other conditions such as an SBD RING alert. Responses returned as a result of a query are called information responses.

Result codes can be represented by text if the 9602-LP is in verbose mode or with numbers if in numeric mode. The command ATVn informs the 9602-LP whether to respond in verbose or numeric mode. Responses can be suppressed by setting the command ATQn to ATQ1. The table below shows the difference in format between these modes.

**Table 1: Numeric and Verbose Response Formats**

Invalid input for certain types of commands will cause the 9602-LP to return a short description of failure before returning the information response and error message. Command entries to the 9602-LP with invalid syntax typically cause the 9602-LP to respond with an ERROR. Command entries of valid syntax with an out-of-range parameter can cause the 9602-LP to respond in one of the three ways:

- Disallow out-of-range entry and respond with ERROR,
- Disallow out-of-range entry and respond with OK,
- and disallow out-of-range entry, accept the closest in-range value, and respond with OK.

## 3 COMMAND DESCRIPTIONS

### 3.1 +++ – ESCAPE TRACKING MODE

Force the 9602-LP to leave Tracking mode and to enter Command mode. Before entering Command mode, the 9602-LP will display the information response of “COMMAND MODE”.

**NOTE:** The 9602-LP is factory-set to power up in Command mode. It can be reprogrammed to power up in either Command mode or Tracking mode with AT^STARTn. If the 9602-LP is powered up in Tracking mode and AT^CALn is set to “Sleep between reports”, then the 9602-LP will ONLY accept the +++ command when it is not sleeping. If the 9602-LP is in Tracking mode and AT^CALn is set to “Callable between reports”, then the 9602-LP will accept the +++ command at any time to transition from Tracking to Command mode. In addition, the 9602-LP tracking statuses are echoed back to the connected DTE in the form of AT commands.

### 3.2 AT – ATTENTION CODE

This is the prefix for all commands except A/ and +++. When entered by itself, the 9602-LP will respond with OK.

### 3.3 A/ – REPEAT LAST COMMAND

Repeat the last command issued to the 9602-LP unless power was interrupted or the 9602-LP is reset. A/ is not followed by <CR>.

### 3.4 EN – ECHO

Echo command characters to DTE.

- 0 Characters are not echoed to the DTE
- 1 Characters are echoed to the DTE (default)

### 3.5 IN – IDENTIFICATION

Request the 9602-LP to display information about itself.

- 0 “2400” (for compatibility only)
- 1 “0000” (for compatibility only)

- 2 "OK" (for compatibility only)
- 3 "XXXXXXXX" (software revision level of micro-controller/GPS) then on the next line "XXXXXXXX" (software revision level of 9602 RF board)
- 4 "NAL Research Corporation 9602-LP" (product description)
- 5 "8816" (for compatibility only)
- 6 "XXX" (9602 RF board factory identity)
- 7 "XXXXXXXX" (9602 RF board hardware specification)

### 3.6 QN – QUIET MODE

Control the 9602-LP responses to DTE.

- 0 9602-LP responses are sent to the DTE (default)
- 1 9602-LP responses are NOT sent to the DTE

### 3.7 VN – VERBOSE MODE

Set the response format of the 9602-LP, which may be either numeric or textual.

- 0 Numeric responses
- 1 Textual responses (default)

### 3.8 ZN – SOFT RESET

Soft reset the 9602-LP's active operating profile to a user-defined operating profile that has been previously stored using &Wn. The active operating profile will revert back to the user-defined operating profile designated under the &Yn command at power reset.

- 0 Restores user-defined operating profile 0
- 1 Restores user-defined operating profile 1

### 3.9 &FN – RESTORE FACTORY SETTINGS

Soft reset the 9602-LP's active operating profile to factory-default operating profile. The active operating profile will revert back to the user-defined operating profile designated under the &Yn command at power reset. This does not reset ^RUP, ^ID, encryption/decryption keys or the crypto officer password.

- 0 Recall factory-default operating profile



## 3.10 &V – VIEW ACTIVE AND STORED CONFIGURATIONS

View the current active operating profile and stored operating profiles.

## 3.11 &WN – STORE ACTIVE CONFIGURATION

Store the current active operating profile as user-defined operating profile in non-volatile memory for later use.

- 0 Store current (active) configuration profile as user-defined operating profile 0
- 1 Store current (active) configuration profile as user-defined operating profile 1

## 3.12 &YN – DESIGNATE DEFAULT RESET PROFILE

Select user-defined operating profile for use after power-up.

- 0 Select user-defined operating profile 0 (default)
- 1 Select user-defined operating profile 1

**NOTE:** The 9602-LP is factory-set to have the user-defined operating profile 0 as the factory-default operating profile.

## 3.13 \*F – FLUSH TO EEPROM (FOR COMPATIBILITY ONLY)

On the standard 9602 this flushes all pending writes to EEPROM, shuts down the RF board or radio, and prepares the unit to be powered down. The command returns OK upon completion, at which point it is safe to remove the power without losing non-volatile data. On the 9602-LP this command does not do anything but only returns a success response.

## 3.14 \*RN – RADIO ACTIVITY

Control radio activity.

- 0 Disable radio activity
- 1 Enable radio activity (default)

While the radio is disabled:

- SBD sessions cannot be initiated; they will immediately return with an error
- No SBD Automatic Notifications will be issued for automatic-MT messages
- No registration, i.e. location updates will be performed

- The baseband circuitry is still active and the 9602-LP still accepts AT commands

This command allows the FA (field application, the “host” of the 9602-LP) to reduce detectable emissions from the RF circuitry during the idle periods between SBD sessions, and also provides a degree of power saving in cases where it may be inconvenient for the FA to power down the 9602-LP.

### 3.15 \*SN – L-BAND TRANSCEIVER ON/OFF

Control state of the LBT.

- 0 LBT power is off
- 1 LBT power is on

When the Iridium RF board is OFF, only AT\*Sn command and AT GPS commands work on the 9602-LP.

#### **Read Command: \*S?**

Query the current LBT setting. The response is in the form:

<setting>

### 3.16 \*W – WAIT

#### **Exec Command: \*W=<w>,<m>,<s>**

This turns the GPS receiver and rf board off for <m> minutes and <s> seconds. During this off time, the unit can only be awoken by a change to Test or Emergency modes or if enabled by <w>, motion detected on the motion sensor.

<w>:

Whether the motion sensor will wake the unit up from sleep mode. ‘1’ is wakes up and ‘0’ is let’s sleep.

<m>:

Number of minutes to wait. Valid values are between 0 and 99.

<S>:

Number of seconds to wait. Valid values are between 0 and 59.

**NOTE:** If <m> and <s> are both 0 an ERROR will be returned.

***Command Response:***

This will return OK, the unit will go into Sleep mode, and nothing else will be returned.

***Test Command: \*W=?***

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

**NOTE:** Since the active profile is not started over a sleep period the unit will revert back to the stored profile when it wakes up.

### 3.17 +CGMI – MANUFACTURER IDENTIFICATION

***Exec Command: +CGMI***

Query the 9602-LP manufacturer.

### 3.18 +CGMM – MODEL IDENTIFICATION

***Exec Command: +CGMM***

Query the 9602-LP model.

### 3.19 +CGMR – REVISION

***Exec Command: +CGMR***

Query the 9602-LP revision.

### 3.20 +CGSN – SERIAL NUMBER

***Exec Command: +CGSN***

Query the 9602-LP IMEI.

## 3.21 +CIER – INDICATOR EVENT REPORTING

**Set Command:** +CIER=[<mode>[,<sigind>[,<svcind>[,<antind>]]]]

The set command enables or disables sending of the +CIEV unsolicited result code from the 9602-LP to the DTE in case of indicator state changes. <mode> controls the processing of the +CIEV unsolicited result codes.

<mode>:

- 0 Disable indicator event reporting; do not send +CIEV unsolicited result codes to the DTE; buffer the most recent indicator event for each indicator in the 9602-LP (default)
- 1 Enable indicator event reporting; buffer the most recent +CIEV unsolicited result code for each indicator when the data port is reserved (e.g. in SBD data mode) and flush them to the DTE after reservation; otherwise forward them directly to the DTE

<sigind>:

Control reporting of “signal quality” indicator changes:

- 0 No “signal quality” indicator reporting
- 1 Enable “signal quality” indicator reporting using result code  
+CIEV:0,<rsssi>

where <rsssi> is:

- 0 Equivalent to 0 bars on the signal strength indicator
- 1 Equivalent to 1 bar on the signal strength indicator
- 2 Equivalent to 2 bars on the signal strength indicator
- 3 Equivalent to 3 bars on the signal strength indicator
- 4 Equivalent to 4 bars on the signal strength indicator
- 5 Equivalent to 5 bars on the signal strength indicator

The reported signal strength is the same value that would be returned by the +CSQ command. When enabled, the signal quality indicator is reported only when the signal strength changes.

<svcind>:

Control reporting of “service availability” indicator changes:

- 0 No “service availability” indicator reporting
- 1 Enable “service availability” indicator reporting using result code  
+CIEV:1, <value>

where <value> is:

- 0 Network service is currently unavailable
- 1 Network service is available

Network service availability is equivalent to a signal strength greater than 0. The service availability indicator provides a way for the FA to wait until the 9602-LP can start an SBD session without receiving continual notifications of changes in signal strength.

<antind>:

Control reporting of “antenna fault” indicator changes:

- 0 No “antenna fault” indicator reporting
- 1 Enable “antenna fault” indicator reporting using result code  
+CIEV:2,<value>

where <value> is:

- 0 No antenna fault detected, or antenna fault cleared
- 1 Antenna fault detected, further transmission impossible

An antenna fault indicates that the antenna is not correctly attached, and in order to protect the transmitter no more transmissions are permitted. On seeing an antenna fault, the user should check the antenna connection; the fault will be automatically cleared once the 9602-LP detects network service availability again.

**Read Command: +CIER?**

Query the current indicator event reporting settings. The response is of the form:

+CIER:<mode>, <sigind>, <svcind>, <antind>

---

**Test Command: +CIER=?**

List the supported settings. The response is in the form:

+CIER:(supported <mode>s),(supported <sigind>s),(supported <svcind>s),(supported <antinds>s)

**NOTE:** In <mode> 1, the DTE may miss some indicator state changes if they occur while the data port is reserved. However, the buffering mechanism ensures that the most recent change for each indicator during the reservation will be flushed to the DTE after reservation; thus the DTE is always made aware of the latest state of each indicator.

**NOTE:** The DTE may initiate an SBD session even if service is unavailable; in this case, the 9602-LP makes an immediate search for the network and, if successful, starts the SBD session, otherwise the SBD session fails.

## 3.22 +CRIS – RING INDICATION STATUS

### Exec Command: +CRIS

Query the ring indication status, returning the cause for the latest assertion of the Ring Indicator. The response contains distinct indications for telephony and SBD ring indications.

The response is in the form:

+CRIS:<tri>,<sri>

where <tri> indicates the telephony ring indication status (for compatibility):

0      No telephony ring alert received.

and <sri> indicates the SBD ring indication status:

0      No SBD Ring Alert received.

1      SBD Ring Alert received.

**NOTE:** The <tri> response is included for compatibility with 9522A applications. The results in the <tri> response should be ignored for 9602 applications. For the 9602 only the <sri> response should be evaluated.

## 3.23 +CSQ[F] – SIGNAL QUALITY

### **Exec Command: +CSQ[F]**

Execution command returns the received signal strength indication <rss> from the 9602-LP.

Response is in the form:

+CSQ:<rss>

where <rss> indicates:

- 0 Equivalent to 0 bars displayed on the signal strength indicator
- 1 Equivalent to 1 bar displayed on the signal strength indicator
- 2 Equivalent to 2 bars displayed on the signal strength indicator
- 3 Equivalent to 3 bars displayed on the signal strength indicator
- 4 Equivalent to 4 bars displayed on the signal strength indicator
- 5 Equivalent to 5 bars displayed on the signal strength indicator

**NOTE:** The +CSQ form of the command waits for an updated signal strength reading to become available. This will usually be within two seconds of issuing the command. If the 9602-LP is in the process of acquiring the system, or in a satellite handoff, a delay in response of up to 50 seconds may be experienced. If the 9602-LP has not proceeded to successful registration, the delay in response may exceed the 50 second timeout limit. Under such condition, an ERROR response will be received. To avoid a delayed response due to registration problems, issue the +CREG command to verify registration prior to entering the +CSQ command to obtain signal strength.

**NOTE:** The +CSQF form of the command returns immediately, reporting the last known signal strength.

### **Test Command: +CSQ=?**

List the supported signal strength indications. The response is in the form:

+CSQ:(supported <rss>s)

## 3.24 +CULK – UNLOCK

### **Exec Command: +CULK=<unlock key>**

Unlock the 9602-LP after it has been locked by the Gateway. The unlock key must be obtained by contacting Iridium's customer support.

<unlock key>:

0000000000000000 .. FFFFFFFFFFFFFFFF

A string of 16 hexadecimal digits.

While the 9602-LP is locked, it is unable to perform any SBD sessions. Any attempts to start a session will return an error code indicating that the 9602-LP is locked.

### **Command Response:**

+CULK:<status>

where <status> indicates the lock status of the 9602-LP following the unlock attempt:

- 0 Unlocked – 9602-LP is not locked and is permitted to perform SBD sessions.
- 1 Locked – 9602-LP is locked and unable to perform SBD sessions. It must be unlocked by supplying the correct unlock key to the +CULK command.
- 2 Permanently locked – 9602-LP is locked and unable to perform SBD sessions. It cannot be unlocked and must be returned to the supplier.

### **Read Command: +CULK?**

Query the current lock status of the 9602-LP. The response is of the form:

+CULK:<status>

where <status> indicates:

- 0 Unlocked
- 1 Locked
- 2 Permanently locked

## 3.25 +GMI – MANUFACTURER IDENTIFICATION

### **Exec Command: +GMI**

Query the 9602-LP manufacturer (same as command +CGMI).



## 3.26 +GMM – MODEL IDENTIFICATION

**Exec Command: +GMM**

Query the 9602-LP model (same as command +CGMM).

## 3.27 +GMR – REVISION

**Exec Command: +GMR**

Query the 9602-LP revision (same as command +CGMR).

## 3.28 +GSN – SERIAL NUMBER

**Exec Command: +GSN**

Query the 9602-LP IMEI (same as command +CGSN).

## 3.29 +IPR – FIXED DTE RATE

**Set Command: +IPR=<rate>**

Set the data rate at which the 9602-LP will accept commands. The 9602-LP supports a different range of baud rates than the standard 9602-N.

<rate> takes the following values:

**Read Command: +IPR?**

Query the current data rate. The response is in the form:

+IPR: <rate>

**Test Command: +IPR=?**

List the supported data rates. The response is in the form:

+IPR: (supported <rate> settings)

If this command was used and the configuration was not saved, then the original configuration can be restored by power cycling the modem. If this command has been saved to memory, then perform the following to save into the configuration:

1. Change the settings on the serial communications program to use the baud rate it has been set to
2. Issue the Command, "AT+IPR=6"
3. Change the settings on the serial communications program to use 19200 bps as the baud rate
4. Issue the Command "AT+GSN". If the IMEI number of the unit is not returned then repeat step 1 at a different baud rate. Otherwise continue to the next step

Issue the Command "AT&Wn&Yn" where n is the profile you are currently using. For example, "AT&W0&Y0"

### 3.30 +PA – GPS: LIST OF NMEA MESSAGE FORMATS

**Exec Command: +PA=<n>**

This command returns the complete NMEA message format, where <n> is an integer number ranging from 1 to C corresponding to the following NMEA and proprietary u-blox formats:

### 3.31 +PD – GPS: UTC DATE

#### **Exec Command: +PD**

This command returns UTC date with the format shown below. The <Invalid Position Fix> message will appear only if the GPS receiver could not acquire a position fix.

#### **Command Response:**

+PD:  
UTC Date = <mm>-<dd>-<yyyy>  
<Invalid Position Fix>  
Satellites Used = <zz>

where:

<mm> Month(01-12), 01 may appear for an <Invalid Position Fix>  
<dd> Day(01-31), 06 may appear for an <Invalid Position Fix>  
<yyyy> Year(0000-9999), 1980 may appear for an <Invalid Position Fix>  
<zz> Number of satellites used to obtain information

### 3.32 +PG – GPS: GPS AUTOMATICALLY SENT

#### **Exec Command: +PG=<Enable>[,<mode>[,<rate>[,<messages>]]]**

This command automatically sets the unit to return GPS information at a set rate through the multi-interface connector.

<Enable> 0 is off, 1 is on  
<mode> Determines whether to send in command mode or in tracking mode. 1 is in command mode only, 2 is in tracking mode only and 3 is in command or tracking mode.  
<rate> Frequency that the GPS information is sent over in seconds.  
<messages> Which messages are sent at the specified rate. Current list of NMEA and proprietary ublox messages are: 1 GGA, 2 GLL, 6 RMC, 7 VTG, 8 ZDA, A PUBX00 and B PUBX01.

### ***Read Command: +PG?***

Returns the current settings with the messages displayed as a hexadecimal number showing what messages are set to be sent. The bit correspondence is as follows:

Returns the current settings with the messages displayed as a hexadecimal number showing what messages are set to be sent. The bit correspondence is as follows

### 3.33 +PL – GPS: DISPLAY POSITION TO 4TH DECIMAL PLACE

**Exec Command: +PL**

This command returns position with the format shown below. The <Invalid Position Fix> message will appear only if the GPS receiver could not acquire a position fix. The latitude and longitude have been rounded to 4<sup>th</sup> place. The AT+PLOC command is recommended to obtain GPS information.

**Command Response:**

+PL:

Altitude=<#> meters

### 3.38 +PSREG – GPS: NETWORK REGISTRATION UTILIZING GPS

#### **Exec Command: +PSREG**

This command initiates an SBD session to perform a manual SBD registration, consisting of an attach and location update. This session does not transfer an MO or MT messages.

**NOTE:** This command is the same as the +SBDREG command, only +PSREG sends GPS information as the location argument. The command response is the same; however, it is listed below for convenience. <MOMSN>:

The Mobile Originated Message Sequence Number (MOMSN) is a value assigned by the 9602-LP when sending a mobile-originated message to the GSS. <MT status>:

The MT status provides an indication of the disposition of the mobile terminated transaction. The field can take on the following values:

  - If there is no mobile terminated SBD message waiting to be retrieved from the 9602-LP, the message length and checksum fields will be zero.
- The mobile terminated message buffer will be empty upon power-up.
- When using a 9602-LP tracker with encryption enabled and the decryption key set to all 0s, the +SBDRB command will be disabled.

### ***Command Response:***

There are no response codes generated by the 9602-LP for this command.

### 3.53 +SBDREG – SHORT BURST DATA: NETWORK REGISTRATION

**Exec Command:** +SBDREG[=<location>]

This command initiates an SBD session to perform a manual SBD registration, consisting of an attach and location update. This session does not transfer an MO or MT messages.

- Once the FA receives the READY indication from the 9602-LP, the SBD message must be sent from the FA as follows:

- If any data is currently in the mobile originated buffer, it will be overwritten.

### 3.59 +SBDWT – SHORT BURST DATA: WRITE A TEXT MESSAGE TO THE 9602-LP

**Exec Command:** +SBDWT=[<text message>]

This command is used to transfer a text SBD message from the FA to the single mobile originated buffer in the 9602-LP.

The text message may be entered on the command line:

- For example, "AT+SBDWT=hello".
- The length of <text message> is limited to 120 bytes. This is due to the length limit on the AT command line interface.
- The message is terminated when a carriage return is entered.

Alternatively, the text message may be entered separately:

Iridium system time source: The system time is available and valid only after the 9602-LP has registered with the network and has received the Iridium system time from the network. Once the time is received, the 9602-LP uses its internal clock to increment the counter. In addition, at least every 8 hours, or on location update or other event that requires re-registration, the 9602-LP will obtain a new system time from the network.

Time localization: None. The system time value is always expressed in GMT time.

Resolution and accuracy: The resolution of the system time is one Iridium frame tick, or 90 ms. Accuracy as measured by the difference between the time reported and the actual time it is sent out the 9602-LP serial port should not exceed 4 frame ticks (.36 seconds) and in most cases will be one frame tick (.09 seconds) or less.

### 3.61 ^BIGR – BLOCK INVALID GPS REPORTS

**Exec Command:** ^BIGR=<n>,<t>,<e>

This determines in which modes sending of GPS reports with an invalid fix is blocked.

**NOTE:** If the 9602-LP is in Tracking mode and the ^CALn option is set for Sleep between reports, then the 9602-LP will accept the +++ command only when it is sending out a report. This will occur the first few seconds after startup. It will reject all AT commands while sleeping.

**NOTE:** If TBR is not set to a value greater than 1 minute the 9602-LP will not “sleep between reports” instead it will remain in “Callable between reports” mode.

Allow a unique static identifier (platform identifier of the 9602-LP) to be entered and added to the GPS report. When n takes on a value of 1, an <id> of up to 50 characters long must appear immediately after and enclosed inside two double quotes (" ").

<id>: The static identifier to be included in every GPS report, enclosed by " ", and can be up to 50 characters long.

**Read Command:** ^ID?

Query the current ID status and displays the static identifier if available.

**IMPORTANT:** Iridium charges a minimum of 30 bytes for each SBD message. The 9602-LP compresses each GPS report to 30 bytes, not including the static identifier, to minimize airtime cost. Thus, keeping static ID short will reduce per message cost.

These bytes must be entered with mandatory leading 0s, where each byte is represented by 2 hexadecimal uppercase characters for a total of 64 digits. The password and key will not be reset by &F. The password and key will not be echoed. This command must be entered twice before an update is made.

**NOTE:** The Decryption key must match the Encryption key at the base station or network operation center (NOC).

<password>: The Crypto Officer Password which must be enclosed by two single quotes ( ' ' ).

The Crypto Officer Password must be changed from its factory-set value before this command will work.

<key>: The key that must be enclosed by two single quotes ( ' ' ). This can only have characters 0-9 or A-F and must be 64 bytes long. For example,

### 3.78 ^MAME – MEMORY ALL MEMORY ERASE

**Exec Command:** ^MSA=<normal>,<test>,<emergency>

This determines which states awake from sleep by activity from the motion sensor. It also determines the parameters which define motion on the sensor.

<normal>: '1' if when the motion sensor detects movement it will send out a report when sleeping in normal state. '0' if it will not. Default is '0'.

<test>: '1' if when the motion sensor detects movement it will send out a report when sleeping in test state. '0' if it will not. Default is '0'.

<emergency>: '1' if when the motion sensor detects movement it will send out a report when sleeping in emergency state. '0' if it will not. Default is '0'.

**Read Command:** ^MSA?

Returns the current value for Motion Sensor awake in the 3 states: Normal, Test, and Emergency and timing values

**Test Command:** ^MSA=?

Returns a fixed message indicating that this can individually be set in the 3 states for Normal, Test, and Emergency and explains timing values.

### 3.80 ^MSB – MOTION SENSOR BEGIN

**Exec Command:** ^MSB=<m>,<s>

This determines the number of minutes to look for motion for before the unit wakes up.

<m>: Number of minutes to wait to determine movement. The range is from 0 to 60. The value of 0 means that the unit wakes up after sensing a single motion. Default value is 3.

<s>: Sensitivity – How vigorous and consistent the motion must be every minute for the unit to determine it is in motion. The range is 1 to 26 where 1 requires the least motion and 26 requires the most motion.

**Read Command: ^MSB?**

Returns the current state for this command.

Returns a fixed message indicating the ranges this can be set to.

### 3.81 ^MSE – MOTION SENSOR END

**Exec Command: ^MSE=<m>**

This determines the number of minutes to need to see no motion for, before the unit goes back to sleep.

<m>: Number of minutes to wait to determine no movement. The range is from 1 to 60. Default value is 3.

**Read Command: ^MSE?**

Returns the current state for this command.

Returns a fixed message indicating the ranges this can be set to.

### 3.82 ^MSW – MOTION SENSOR WAIT (REVISED)

**Exec Command: ^MSW=<m>**

This determines approximately how long to wait while sleeping between when the GPS wakes up from sleep with the motions sensor one time and when it wakes from sleep again with the motions sensor. This was put in to save battery power for cases where the unit is constantly in motion. The time will only be counted during sleep and it can range across multiple sleep intervals. Changing commands ^MSB and ^S will reset the count for the wait. If transitioning between 2 states that do not both have ^CAL set to 1 then the count will also be reset.

### 3.86 ^RMF – REMOTE MESSAGE FORMAT

**Exec Command:** ^RMF=<n>

This command sets the format of the messages that will be sent to the recipient.

## 3.87 ^RUP – REMOTE UPDATE PASSWORD

### **Exec Command:** ^RUP=<password>

The 9602-LP operating parameters (in the current active operating profile) can be changed and saved from a remote site while the 9602-LP is deployed in the field. A Remote Update password is required each time a remote update is made and can be set with the ^RUP command. The <password> entered must be 8 characters in length and all printable characters are allowed. The factory-set password is 12345678 and there is no requirement to change this password. In order to initiate remote update on the 9602-LP, the password of an incoming message from a remote site must match with the Remote Update password. The Remote Update password also provides a way to identify field units when making mass remote updates.

The 9602-LP remote update format is the same for both standard and encrypted versions. The ^RUP command does not require the Crypto Officer role in order to make changes. Users are referred to the 9602-LP manuals associated with encryption for further details.

### **Read Command:** ^RUP?

Display the current Remote Update Password. It is used to confirm a recently entered password.

The following parameter is required:

<password>: The Remote Update Password which must be enclosed by two single quotes (‘ ’) and must be 8 characters long.

## 3.88 ^SN – SETUP INPUT PINS

### **Exec Command:** ^S<n>=<m>[,<f>[,<r>]][,<l>]]

This configures the input pins of the 9602-LP tracker. There are three pin modes: general input, emergency, and test. And there are two trigger types: rising and falling. When a trigger is enabled and the trigger stimulus is satisfied, the function of the pin mode is triggered. The general input trigger queues an input report (see Appendix C) to be queued for transmission. The emergency trigger enables the emergency tracking state. The test trigger enables the test tracking state. While any pin can be configured as any mode, input 0 is shared with the



emergency switch and defaults to emergency mode with a falling edge trigger. Input 1 default to test mode with a falling edge trigger. Inputs 2 and 3 default to general input with no triggers enabled. Each pin can be configured to be either latching or momentary. A latching input activates when the trigger is activated and deactivates once the trigger is inactive. A momentary configured input is enabled by activating the trigger momentarily and releasing and is disabled by activating the trigger for 3 seconds and releasing.

Changing these settings will force the emergency or test tracking state to return to normal and the latching pin state to be reevaluated.

<n>: 0 - 3 corresponding to the four different input pins.

<m>: Sets the pin mode.

0 – General input

1 – Emergency

2 – Test

<f>: Sets if the pin is triggered on a falling edge. 0 – disabled, 1 – enabled

<r>: Sets if the pin is triggered on a rising edge. 0 – disabled, 1 – enabled

<l>: Sets if the pin is latching or momentary. 0 – momentary, 1 – latching

**Read Command: ^S<n>?**

Returns the current setting for pin <n>

<n>: 0 - 3 corresponding to the four different input pins.

### 3.89 ^SPSR – SAME PLACE, SKIP REPORTS

**Exec Command: ^SPSR=<n>[,<d>[,<b>[,<c>]]]**

If the unit is not moving this will limit the number of GPS reports that are sent out. When enabled, ^SPSR causes the unit to be bounded by a sphere with radius <d>. Report sending is halted when the unit remains in the sphere for a time specified by <b>. Report sending will resume once the unit has left the sphere. Upon leaving the bounding sphere, a new boundary will be created at the current location of the unit. If the unit remains in the boundary for an extended period of time a report may be sent depending on the mode <m> and the number of cycles specified by <c>. An example of how ^SPSR may be useful is if used on a truck the number of reports sent when the truck is parked would be limited.

<n>:

- 0 Turn off the feature.
- 1 Enable this feature for a set number of reports
- 2 Never send another report until it moves

<d>: The radius of a 3D sphere to not send reports in meters. Range is 10 to 65535.

<b>: Number of reports to send while stationary before skipping takes effect. Range is 0 to 65535.

<c>: The number of cycles to skip sending out GPS reports if the unit has not moved.  
Range is 1 to 65535.

**NOTE:** <b> and <c> are measured in report cycles. In general, report cycles last ^TBR seconds. For example, if the unit is to be configured to wait 10 minutes before report skipping begins and ^TBR is set to 2 minutes, <b> should be set to 5 cycles. ( Desired time / ^TBR = <b> )

**NOTE:** If SPSR is enabled and the 9602-LP attempts to send a report without a valid GPS fix, SPSR will not process its report skipping logic. The command ^BGR must be used to block reports with an invalid GPS fix from being sent.

**Read Command: ^SPSR?**

Returns the current settings for this command.

**Test Command: ^SPSR=?**

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values and an explanation of what they mean.

### 3.90 ^SPSRE – SAME PLACE, SKIP REPORTS FOR EMERGENCY STATE

The same as ^SPSR, but for Emergency state.

**Read Command: ^SPSRE?**

Returns the current settings for this command.

### 3.91 ^SPSRT – SAME PLACE, SKIP REPORTS FOR TEST STATE

The same as ^SPSR, but for Test state.

**Read Command: ^SPSRT?**

Returns the current settings for this command.

**Test Command: ^SPSRT=?**

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values and an explanation of what they mean.

### 3.92 ^STARTn – START UP MODE

**Exec Command: ^STARTn**

Set the 9602-LP mode of operation at power up. This will be reset by &F.

- 0 Start in command mode (default)
- 1 Start in tracking mode

**Read Command: ^START?**

Return the current start up mode.

### 3.93 ^STR – SELF TEST RUN

**Exec Command: ^STR**

Causes the 9602-LP to run self-tests and to report the status of all encryption setting parameters. This is the same test performs by the 9602-LP at each power up.

## 3.94 ^TBR – TIME BETWEEN REPORTS

**Exec Command:** ^TBR=<n>

Time between reporting cycles in minutes for tracking mode. <n>, also known as Time Between Reports (TBR), can take on a value between 0 to 10080 in increments of 0.5 (or 30 seconds).

When TBR is set to a value between 0.5 minute and 10080 minutes, an additional parameter called Time To Keep Trying or TTKT dictates how long the 9602-LP tries to send in a single reporting cycle. The value of TTKT can be changed using ^TTKT command. The 9602-LP will attempt to acquire a valid GPS fix and an acceptable Iridium signal strength for SBD transmission within the TTKT-time window. If both a valid GPS fix and an acceptable Iridium signal strength are obtained within the TTKT-time window, then the 9602-LP will transmit the GPS report. The 9602-LP will then immediately go into “Sleep between reports” mode for the remaining of the time until the next reporting cycle. If the 9602-LP is unable to acquire a valid GPS fix and/or unable to obtain an acceptable Iridium signal strength 30 seconds before the TTKT-time window expires, the 9602-LP will be forced to transmit a valid/invalid GPS report anyway. It is possible, but unlikely, that a GPS report with an invalid position fix will be sent and just before the end of the TTKT a GPS fix will be acquired and a valid one will be sent. If a report is missed one of three possible outcomes as shown below will occur in tracking mode:

1. Iridium gateway receives a valid GPS report (SBD Status LED stays solid)
2. Iridium gateway receives an invalid GPS report (SBD Status LED flashes)
3. Iridium gateway does not receive a GPS report (SBD Status LED flashes)

When TBR is set to 0, the 9602-LP will send GPS reports at the fastest possible rate ignoring the TTKT setting (approximately 4 seconds between reports depending on the Iridium and GPS satellites field-of-view with respect to the 9602-LP antennas). The 9602-LP will never go into power-saving mode with all its electronic circuits on at all-time allowing the fastest possible transmission rate.

The default value is 5.

**Read Command: ^TBR?**

Return the current Time Between Reports value.

**Test Command: ^TBR=?**

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

### 3.95 ^TBRA – AWAKE TIME BETWEEN REPORTS

**Exec Command: ^TBRA=<n>**

Time between reporting cycles in minutes for normal state when ^CAL is 2 and the unit is moving. The command functions the same as ^TBR above, but determines the timing for motion and the ^TBR command is used when it is not in motion.

The default value is 0.

**Read Command: ^TBRA?**

Returns the current time between reports value.

**Test Command: ^TBRA=?**

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

### 3.96 ^TBRE – EMERGENCY TIME BETWEEN REPORTS

**Exec Command: ^TBRE=<n>**

Time between reporting cycles in minutes for Emergency state. The command functions the same as ^TBR above, but determines the timing for Emergency mode instead of the normal tracking mode.

The default value is 0.

**Read Command: ^TBRE?**

Returns the current time between reports value.

**Test Command: ^TBRE=?**

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

### 3.97 ^TBREA – AWAKE EMERGENCY TIME BETWEEN REPORTS

**Exec Command:** ^TBREA=<n>

Time between reporting cycles in minutes for Emergency state when ^CALE is 2 and the unit is moving. The command functions the same as ^TBRE above, but determines the timing for motion and the ^TBRE command is used when it is not in motion. The default value is 0.

**Read Command:** ^TBREA?

Returns the current time between reports value.

**Test Command:** ^TBREA=?

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

### 3.98 ^TBRT – TEST TIME BETWEEN REPORTS

**Exec Command:** ^TBRT=<n>

Time between reporting cycles in minutes for Test state. The command functions the same as ^TBR above, but determines the timing for Test state instead of the normal tracking state. The default value is 0.

**Read Command:** ^TBRT?

Returns the current time between reports value.

**Test Command:** ^TBRT=?

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

### 3.99 ^TBRTA – AWAKE TEST TIME BETWEEN REPORTS

**Exec Command:** ^TBRTA=<n>

Time between reporting cycles in minutes for Test state when ^CALT is 2 and the unit is moving. The command functions the same as ^TBRT above, but determines the timing for motion and the ^TBRT command is used when it is not in motion.

The default value is 1.

**Read Command:** ^TBRTA?

Returns the current time between reports value.

**Test Command: ^TBRTA=?**

Returns a fixed message indicating the range of acceptable values.

### 3.100 ^TRF – TEST REPORT FLOOD

**Exec Command: ^TRF=<n>**

This determines how many reports will be sent out continuously when first entering Test mode. After n reports have been sent the interval value ^TBRT will take effect. If n is zero, the tracker will use ^TBRT to determine the rate at which reports are sent. The default value is 0.

**Read Command: ^TRF?**

Query the current value.

**Test Command: ^TRF=?**

Returns the allowable values for the ^TRF command.

### 3.101 ^TRK – ENTER TRACKING MODE

**Exec Command: ^TRK**

Cause the 9602-LP to leave Command mode and enter Tracking mode. Must be the last command in an AT command string.

### 3.102 ^TTKT – TIME TO KEEP TRYING

**Exec Command: ^TTKT=<n>,<v>[,<s>]**

This allows different ways to modify the Time To Keep Trying or TTKT parameter.

If <n> has a value of 0 and <v> is between 12 and 254 then TTKT is set to (5\*v) seconds. The value of <s> is omitted when n=0.

If <n> has a value of 1, then <v> must be between 1 and 21, <s> must be between 0 and 55 and TTKT is set to (<v> minutes + <s> seconds).

If <n> has a value of 0 and <v> has a value of 0, then TTKT is set to be the same as TBR except it will not try to send once 30 seconds before the ^TBR window is over. It will try to send once and if it fails it will not attempt to send another report. A GPS report is sent only when the

9602-LP is able to obtain both a valid GPS fix and an acceptable Iridium signal strength within the TTKT-time window. Otherwise, no GPS report is sent to the Iridium gateway. When callable is false, the RF board will turn on if it is not on already when 30 seconds are remaining.

If <n> has a value of 0 and <v> has a value of 255, then TTKT is again set to be the same as TBR. The reporting procedure is the same as described in ^TBR.

The default TTKT value is n=0 and v=255.

**Read Command: ^TTKT?**

Return value of <v> assuming that <n> is 0.

Returns descriptions of allowable inputs for the TTKT command.

### 3.103 ^TTKTA – AWAKE TIME TO KEEP TRYING

**Exec Command: ^TTKTA=<n>,<v>[,<s>]**

Time To Keep Trying for normal state for when ^CAL2 and the unit is in motion. The command functions the same as ^TTKT above, but determines the timing for normal state when in motion and the ^TTKT determines the timing for normal state when not in motion.

The default value is 255.

**Read Command: ^TTKTA?**

Returns the current time to keep trying settings <v> assuming that <n> is 0.

**Test Command: ^TTKTA=?**

Returns a fixed message describing what can be entered for the TTKTA command.

### 3.104 ^TTKTE – EMERGENCY TIME TO KEEP TRYING

**Exec Command: ^TTKTE=<n>,<v>[,<s>]**

Time To Keep Trying for Emergency state. The command functions the same as ^TTKT above, but determines the timing for Emergency state instead of the normal tracking state.

The default value is 255.



**Read Command: ^TTKTE?**

Returns the current time to keep trying settings <v> assuming that <n> is 0.

**Test Command: ^TTKTE=?**

Returns a fixed message describing what can be entered for the TTKTE command.

### 3.105 ^TTKTEA – AWAKE EMERGENCY TIME TO KEEP TRYING

Time To Keep Trying for Emergency state for when ^CALE2 and the unit is in motion. The command functions the same as ^TTKTE above, but determines the timing for Emergency state when in motion and the ^TTKTE determines the timing for Emergency state when not in motion.

The default value is 255.

**Read Command: ^TTKTEA?**

Returns the current time to keep trying settings <v> assuming that <n> is 0.

**Test Command: ^TTKTEA=?**

Returns a fixed message describing what can be entered for the TTKTEA command.

### 3.106 ^TTKTT – TEST TIME TO KEEP TRYING

**Exec Command: ^TTKTT=<n>,<v>[,<s>]**

Time To Keep Trying for Test state. The command functions the same as ^TTKT above, but determines the timing for Test state instead of the normal tracking state.

The default value is 255.

**Read Command: ^TTKTT?**

Returns the current time to keep trying settings <v> assuming that <n> is 0.

**Test Command: ^TTKTT=?**

Returns a fixed message describing what can be entered for the TTKTT command.

### 3.107 ^TTKTTA – AWAKE TEST TIME TO KEEP TRYING

**Read Command:** ^TTKTTA?

Returns the current time to keep trying settings <v> assuming that <n> is 0.

**Test Command:** ^TTKTTA=?

Returns a fixed message describing what can be entered for the TTKTTA command.

### 3.108 ^UE – USE ENCRYPTION

**Exec Command:** ^UE=<password>,<n>

Set the 9602-LP on whether to use encryption or not at power up. The factory-default setting is not to use encryption at power up. Setting the ^UE command will take effect only after power has been cycled. This command will return an error if the encryption password has not been set.

<password>: The Crypto Officer Password which must be enclosed by two single quotes ( ' ' )

<n>: 0 is not to use encryption and 1 is to use encryption at power up

**Read Command:** ^UE?

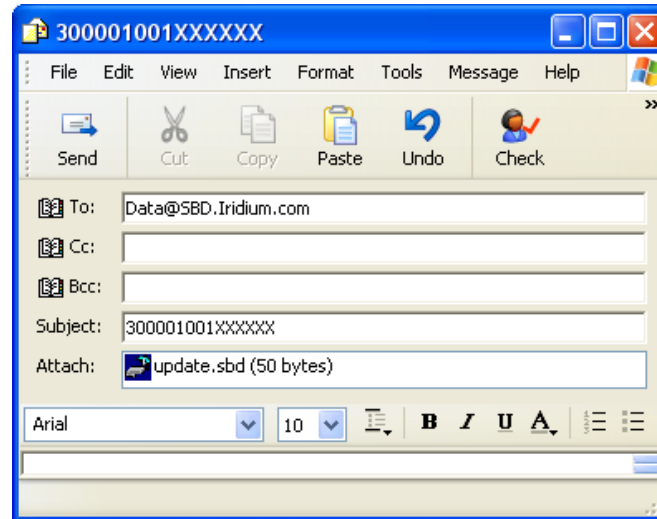
### 5.1 SENDING AN SBD MESSAGE TO THE 9602-LP

Messages can be sent to the 9602-LP via SBD from almost any e-mail program (Outlook, Outlook Express, etc.).

1. In order to send e-mail messages to a 9602-LP, the e-mail program must use the standard Multipurpose Internet Mail Extensions (MIME) Base64 encoding as defined in RFC 2045.

The following instructions describe how to set this up for Microsoft Outlook Express:

- a. Select "Tools/Options"
  - b. Click the "Send" Tab
  - c. Under "Mail Sending Format", click "HTML Settings..."
  - d. Click MIME
  - e. Select "Base 64" for Encode text using
  - f. Click OK
  - g. Under "Mail Sending Format", click "Plain Text Settings..."
  - h. Repeat steps d – f
2. Send all e-mail messages to [Data@SBD.Iridium.com](mailto:Data@SBD.Iridium.com).
  3. Place the IMEI number of the 9602-LP in the subject line.
  4. The message should be carried in an attachment, which must have a ".sbd" extension, as shown in.

The actual message sent from the 9602-LP is in an attachment of the e-mail and the subject line contains the IMEI number of the unit that sent the SBD message.

**NOTE:** The unit location message in the body of the email may be enabled or disabled by the SBD airtime service provider. If using encryption for the .sbd attachments then this should be disabled for greater security.

## APPENDIX A – ENCRYPTED SENDING WITH NO RECEIVING

The 9602-LP has the ability to ignore all incoming messages when encryption is selected. This is done by setting the decryption key to all 0s or by never setting it since its default value is all 0s. The only AT command that is affected is the ^KD – Key for Decryption command. The ^KE – Key for encryption command works the same way as before and rejects all 0s as an unsafe key and thus forces another key to be entered before encryption can be used. The ^KZ command will reset both the encryption and decryption keys to 0. If only the encryption key is entered after the keys are zeroized with the ^KZ command, then all incoming messages will be blocked. If encryption is not selected with the ^UE command, then all incoming messages are allowed. In tracking mode, since there are no incoming messages and the +SBDRING alerts are not needed the +SBDI command is used to send GPS reports rather than the +SBDIX command. For this block no change is required in the Encryption Module or any software that uses it. Users just need to be created with IMEI records that have a decryption key but no encryption key.

The 9602-LP will send an input report when input pins are triggered. The report is sent as a GPS version 6 report (refer to ^RMF for report versions) with UTC timestamp and pin information included as free text. The free text portion of the report uses the following text format:
